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Introduction

STATE AND FEDERAL PROGRAMMING FOR NEWBORNS TO AGE FIVE: *An Informational Review and Reference* is a practical resource for Michigan parents, professionals and administrative leaders to help them better understand how their roles can promote young children's school success. It is designed to provide background and implementation information regarding State and Federal programming for Michigan children ages newborn to five and their families.

The Review also serves as a practical resource for the Michigan educational community. The information is important at district or building levels in order to understand how best to advise staff in planning activities, structuring the environment, collaborating with community agencies and organizations and impressing upon them the importance of working with families through home or site activities.

To provide current programming information, links relating to program guidelines as well as State and Federal resources are provided. The names, telephone numbers and web links in this document are provided as a service to readers, do not indicate any form of recommendation or endorsement, and were current at the time of publication.

A separate page is included for the user to add local or regional contacts, phone numbers or websites.

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Community Collaboratives

Overview

Currently all counties, either individually or in cooperation with other counties, have an established collaborative group that addresses issues that impact the lives of children, families and special populations in their area. These Collaboratives provide for:

- Community planning and visioning (establishes workgroups of agency staff, consumers and community representatives to plan and/or implement services for a target population or coordinate services);
- Sharing of information regarding programs, policies and protocols/procedures;
- Taking responsibility for the local directions and coordination of state, federal, and foundation sponsored collaborative enterprises, including reporting the results/activities;
- Managing state-funded collaborative initiatives and workings with designated fiduciary; and
- Linking with or consolidating other community collaborative groups (Early On Local Interagency Coordinating Councils, Homeless Continuums of Care, Child Abuse/Neglect Councils, Workforce Development, etc.).

Membership of the Community Collaboratives

It is recommended that the membership of the Collaboratives be comprised of public and private sector (director level) representatives from the human services organizations that address various family support needs. These may include:

- Basic Needs (food, shelter, etc.), (Department of Human Services, Homelessness/Housing Continuum of Care, Food Banks), Transportation
- Emotional Health (Community Mental Health, Child Abuse/Neglect Councils, Domestic Violence)
- Medical/Health (Public Health, Health Care Organizations)
- Education and Vocational Training (Intermediate School District, local districts, Post Secondary)
- Family Support (Community Action Agency, MSU Extension, Veteran Services)
- Legal (Family Court Judge, Court Administrator, Prosecuting Attorney, County Sheriff)
- Philanthropic Resources (Funding Organizations, Community Foundations, United Way)
- Jobs/Employment (Michigan WORKS!)
- Spiritual (Faith Based Representative)
- Community Representatives (Local Government, Business, Others)
- Consumers
- Senior Representatives (Area Agency on Aging and Commission on Aging)

Role of the Community Collaboratives

It is recommended that each Community Collaborative serve as the entity that: 1) sets the agenda for collaborative activities; 2) focuses resources on common "outcomes"; and 3) acts as the common community interface with State agencies on State "collaborative" efforts in human services.

Expectations of the Community Collaboratives:

Each Collaborative will be expected to:

- Communicate annually their priority goals for the upcoming year and how they are coordinating existing resources and efforts to achieve those goals.
- Collaborate (share ownership and decision making) in the allocation of new and sustaining resources available to the county to address unmet human services needs.
- Coordinate community efforts to address State priorities.
- Identify barriers to progress that State agencies create.

The majority of Community Collaboratives utilize community needs assessments to direct their work. Community Collaboratives have conducted their own needs assessment or utilized assessments done by member organizations. The community needs assessments have been used by the Community Collaboratives to guide decision-making on funding support for programs/services and to communicate with their elected officials (county commissioners, state legislators).

Community Collaboratives utilize workgroups/committees to accomplish their work. This provides the opportunity for all level of staff, consumers, and community representatives to:

- ✓ plan or implement a system of care, develop a community plan or action plan for a target population,
- ✓ plan to meet a specific need in the community (substance abuse prevention, infant mortality), and/or
- ✓ develop community wide initiatives (positive youth development/asset development).

Overview

The Early Childhood Investment Corporation (ECIC) is a public, non-profit corporation designed to be Michigan's leading voice for investment and accountability in a comprehensive system of early childhood supports and resources for children newborn – 5 and their families.

ECIC was formed in February 2005 with the support of Governor Granholm and her Children's Cabinet to lead the development and implementation of Michigan's comprehensive, early childhood system – the *Great Start* system. The vision for the *Great Start* is that every young child in Michigan would arrive at the kindergarten door safe, healthy, eager and ready for school success.

To achieve this vision, the ECIC has four key goals:

- ***Knowledge Development/Research***

ECIC's work and activities are always informed by quantitative and qualitative investigation, as well as evidence-based practices.

- ***Increasing Investment***

ECIC is working to quantify Michigan's current public investment in early childhood programs and services and to assure the most efficient and effective use of Federal, state and local public and private funds. As an innovative public non-profit corporation, the ECIC can receive and leverage funds from both the public and private sectors.

- ***Advancing Public Education and Public Will***

ECIC focuses on increasing public awareness and community education to ensure an educated, involved and mobilized public that ranks Michigan's young children among our highest priorities and stimulates public/private investment in early childhood programs and services.

- ***Building Local Early Childhood Systems through Great Start Collaboratives***

As of January 2007, the ECIC has funded 21 Great Start Collaboratives through local Intermediate School Districts (ISDs). Great Start Collaboratives provide a forum for community leaders— from all walks of life – to work together to create a better future for all young children in their communities. Through an in-depth community assessment, engagement and strategic planning process communities create an action agenda to improve the health, development and learning of young children. ECIC is committed to funding *Great Start Collaboratives* throughout Michigan, with the goal of convening Great Start Collaboratives in every ISD by 2010.

Approximately 650,000 children under age five live in Michigan. All of them deserve high quality health care, child care and early education so that they can achieve their optimal potential in school and in life. But each year too many Michigan children enter kindergarten with previously unidentified health, social-emotional or learning problems. Many parents lack easy access to information and resources in their communities that would help them in their role as their child's first and most important teachers. The Early Childhood Investment Corporation (ECIC) is working to ensure that all of Michigan's children are healthy, safe, eager and ready to succeed in life.

Early Childhood Special Education Program and Services (ECSE)

Overview

Federally funded early childhood special education programs and services for children, newborn through five years of age and their families, are provided through local school districts and intermediate school districts. Professionals with training and expertise in special education services implement the federal **Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)**, <http://idea.ed.gov> Part B, by supporting the educational needs of young children and families.

Eligibility

Eligible children must be determined by an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to have one or more of the impairments that necessitate special education programs or related services or both.

Collaboration

Early childhood special education professionals and related services personnel provide specialized educational services to children with disabilities in a variety of settings such as early childhood classrooms, child care, prekindergarten, Head Start, the community and other early childhood settings to meet the developmental learning needs of these children. In addition, families and early childhood providers may request information about appropriate expectations for children's development.

Funding

MI has received federal funding under this legislation since 1975 and supplemented it with state funding.

Early Head Start

Overview

In 1995, the Early Head Start program was established to serve children from newborn to three years of age in recognition of the mounting evidence that the earliest years matter a great deal to children's growth and development. The program helps children develop physically, emotionally, intellectually and socially. It provides parent education and services such as home visits, comprehensive health services, nutrition and peer support groups for parents. Early Head Start projects coordinate with local Head Start programs so that children have a continuity of services as they grow older.

Funding

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services awards grants to local public and private non-profit agencies. The federal resources contribute 80 percent of the cost of a program and the community provides the remaining 20 percent. Some funding is set aside for training and technical assistance to local programs to help them meet the Program Performance Standards; for research, evaluation and demonstrations of innovative program models and required monitoring activities.

Eligibility

Early Head Start provides services for pregnant women and children from newborn to three years of age while Head Start is intended for children from the age of three to the age when children enter kindergarten. Programs serve those families who have incomes at or below the poverty line or are eligible for public assistance. The law permits up to 10 percent of the Head Start children to be from families that do not meet these low-income criteria. Under the reauthorization effective in fall, 2008, Head Start will require that a minimum of 10 percent of the children served have a disability.

Staff Requirements

Early Head Start staff working as teachers with infants and toddlers must meet the same requirements as teachers and staff within a center-based Head Start program.

Collaboration

Early Head Start Programs are required to collaborate and hold regular meetings with community partners.

Early On[®] Michigan

Overview

Early On is a statewide, comprehensive, coordinated interagency system of early intervention services for infants and toddlers newborn to age 36 months with disabilities and developmental delays and their families. In Michigan, *Early On* is coordinated by the Michigan Department of Education and provides services under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). *Early On[®] Michigan* is a system designed to coordinate early intervention and other services for families who have children (ages 0 - 36 months) experiencing developmental delays or who have disabilities or special needs.

An outreach system which includes the components of public awareness, inquiry, screening and referral was established. Every local health department has at least one professional in place who is designated as its liaison to help families access *Early On* services. Any family concerned about the development or health of their child can access the system by contacting a local agency or by calling 1-800-*Early On*.

***Early On Michigan[®]* services can include:** Speech pathology, audiology, occupational therapy, psychological services, service coordination, diagnostic medical services, early identification, screening, assessment services, health services, nursing services, social work services, vision services, special equipment, nutritional counseling, transportation, counseling (family, group, individual), family skills training, home visits and special instruction.

Collaboration

Local communities receive funding through their local Intermediate School District (ISD) to implement *Early On*. Each local ISD jurisdiction has an interagency coordinating council (comprised of individuals from human service agencies, parents, educators and other agency personnel who serve families) that guides implementation locally. Implementation is also guided through local memoranda of understanding between education, mental health, public health and social services.

Eligibility

Infants and toddlers from newborn through age 36 months who need early intervention services because they are experiencing developmental delays and/or have a diagnosed physical or mental condition that has a high probability of resulting in developmental delay are eligible.

Available services include assistive technology device; audiology; family training, counseling and home visits; health services; medical services; nursing services; nutrition services; occupational therapy; physical therapy; psychological services; service coordination services; social work services; special instruction; speech-language pathology; transportation and related costs and vision services.

To the maximum extent appropriate to the needs of the child, *Early On* services will be provided in natural environments including the home and community settings.

Funding

Authorized by Part C of the **Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)**. MI has received funding since 1986. Monies are allocated based on the number of infants and toddlers eligible for *Early On* services within each ISD and a base grant (based on size and numbers) for administration and coordination functions.

Early On is a family-focused process with emphasis on family strengths and abilities, which requires the development of an individualized family service plan (IFSP) specific to each enrolled family, based on the findings of a multidisciplinary evaluation of the child and family.

Staff Requirements

Early On Coordinators are located in each intermediate school district area and are available to help parents decide if they want to enter the **Early On** system.

Services

1. Evaluation

If it is suspected that the child has a developmental delay or a condition that could lead to such delay, an evaluation is initiated. (The child may not have to repeat an evaluation if an evaluation has already been completed by a different agency.)

2. Individualized Family Service Plan

If the child is eligible for **Early On** services, an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed. The IFSP addresses the developmental needs of the baby or toddler as well as the needs of the family in helping the child.

3. Service Coordination

An **Early On** Service Coordinator helps the parents coordinate the services outlined in their child's plan.

4. Implementation

Services outlined in the IFSP are implemented with permission of parent.

What is the cost? Are there any income restrictions?

There is no charge to families for an evaluation, the development of an IFSP or service coordination. Most services outlined in the IFSP are available at no cost, but that is determined individually. **Early On** is available regardless of income.

Does the family play a role in *Early On* Services?

Family-centered care is the set of beliefs and principles that are the foundation for **Early On**. Family-centered care is a new way of thinking about and working with children and their families. At the heart of family-centered care is the recognition that the family is the constant in the child's life. Family-centered care builds equal partnerships between families and professionals and promotes trust and respect. Family-centered care honors the priorities, choices and resources of the family.

(William F. Goodling) Even Start Family Literacy Program










Overview




Even Start is a family literacy early childhood initiative funded through federal Title I Part B - Subpart 3 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Each eligible family must have a child aged 0-7 years and a parent/guardian who is eligible for adult basic education or is functionally illiterate. The program must provide adult literacy education or adult basic education, early childhood education and parenting education. A school district/public school academy must collaborate with a non-district agency to provide the program. Funding level is a maximum of \$225,000 per year (over the four-year period of the grant) with increasing local match from 10% to 65%.

This grant program is to help break the cycle of poverty and illiteracy by improving the educational opportunities of the nation's low-income families by integrating early childhood education, adult literacy or adult basic education and parenting education into a unified family literacy program. A district and a community organization must apply as a collaborative entity. Increasing matching funds are required of the local grant program during the four-year grant cycle.

Great Parents, Great Start

Overview

The Michigan Department of Education administers the Great Parents, Great Start Continuation Grants. Funding provides continuation of collaborative community efforts to develop parent involvement and education programs.

Eligibility Requirements

Michigan Intermediate School Districts are the only eligible grantees. Programs must be designed for families of children from newborn to age five.

Staff Requirements

Staff involved in parent/family visits must have at least an Associate degree with early childhood classes and be certified Parent Educators.

Funding Sources

Supported through Section 32j of the State School Aid Act, as amended, P.A. 137 of 2007.

Services


Five components are required:

- ▶ Information on child development
- ▶ Methods to enhance parent/child interaction
- ▶ Examples of learning opportunities to promote intellectual, physical and social growth of children
- ▶ Access to needed community services through a community- school-home partnership
- ▶ Information promoting marriage

Collaboration Requirements

Requires a collaborative community effort through a community-school-home partnership.

Great Start School Readiness Program – Competitive

Overview

Preschool programs for four-year-old children who may be "at risk" of school failure. Each child must have two of the 25 identified risk factors (see page 22); more than 50% of the children must be low income. Both center-based and home-based models are available. All programs must provide strong family involvement/parent education components as well as preschool education.

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Great Start School Readiness Program (GSRP) **State Aid (School Districts/PSAs ONLY)**

Overview

A preschool program for four-year-old children at risk of becoming educationally disadvantaged and who may have extraordinary need of special assistance.

Eligibility Requirements

Children must be 4 on or before December 1. Children and families become eligible for the program if they exhibit two of the 25 "risk" factors listed on page 22; more than 50% of the children enrolled must meet an income criterion. The rest of the children can exhibit any two risk factors and do not need to meet an income criterion.

Teaching Staff Requirements

Teachers must have a valid certificate with an Early Childhood Endorsement (ZA). Paraprofessionals or Associate Teachers must have an Associates degree in early childhood/preschool education, child development, child care or Child Development Associate (CDA) credential or equivalent continuing education experience as approved by the State Board of Education.

Funding Sources

The *MI State School Aid Act* provides funds for preschool programs under Sections 32d, 37-40 of the **State School Aid Act**. http://www.michigan.gov/documents/mde/2007-PA-0137_227909_7.pdf.

Services

Requires a validated preschool curriculum, home visits, parent/teacher conferences, family activities and parent education services. An Implementation Manual is available for administrative and teaching staff (see below).

Collaboration Requirements

Community collaboration is required. Involvement by families of the children is required through home visits, parent/teacher conferences, family activities and parent education programs.

Head Start

Overview

Head Start is a national program that promotes school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of educational, health, nutritional, social and other services to enrolled children and families.

Funding

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services awards grants to local public and private non-profit agencies. The federal resources contribute 80 percent of the cost of a program and the community provides the remaining 20 percent. Some funding is set aside for training and technical assistance to local programs to help them meet the Program Performance Standards; for research, evaluation and demonstrations of innovative program models and required monitoring activities.

Announcements for the availability of funds for new programs are published as a Request for Proposal (RFP) at **Grants.gov**. Announcements are also available at the Web site of the **Administration for Children and Families (ACF)** at http://www.acf.hhs.gov/grants/grants_hsb.html

Eligibility

Head Start is intended for children from the age of three to the age when children enter kindergarten. Programs serve those families who have incomes at or below the poverty line or are eligible for public assistance. The law permits up to 10 percent of the Head Start children to be from families that do not meet these low-income criteria.

Under the reauthorization effective in fall, 2008, Head Start will require that a minimum of 10 percent of the children served have a disability. Such children are expected to be enrolled in a full range of Head Start services and activities in an inclusive or natural setting with their non-disabled peers and to receive needed special education and related services.

Staff Requirements

At least half of all Head Start teachers in center-based programs must have an associate, baccalaureate, or advanced degree in Early Childhood Education or a degree in a related field with pre-school teaching experience. If a classroom in a center-based program does not have a teacher with a degree in early childhood education or a related field with experience in teaching preschool children, the teacher must have a Child Development Associate (CDA) credential or a State awarded certificate for preschool teachers that meets or exceeds the requirements of a CDA credential.

Collaboration

Head Start Programs are required to collaborate and hold regular meetings with community partners.

Zero To Three Secondary Prevention

Overview

Grants to community-based collaborative secondary prevention programs for families of children ages 0-3.

Services

Services are designed to promote marriage and foster positive parenting skills, improve parent/child interaction, promote access to needed community services, increase local capacity to serve families at risk, improve school readiness and support healthy family environments that discourage alcohol, tobacco and other drug use.

Funding

Fiscal Year 2008 funds will be committed to continue projects in various areas of the state but also identify new areas to be served. Grants are distributed through an interagency process in conjunction with the Children's Trust Fund and the interagency director's workgroup.

Collaboration Requirements

Support of the local community collaborative is required. A 25 percent local match, of which not more than 10 percent is in-kind, is also required.
