Over the past several years Armada's Medical Science programs have rapidly grown in popularity. Students with an interest in the nursing field have the opportunity to get handson experience and a leg up in the workplace through the CNA program.

The Certified Nursing Assistant Program is a concurrent enrollment program through Macomb Community College that has helped students through laboratory experiences in developing career skills. The CNA program is taught by our teacher with a nursing background, Mrs. Mahfet, and is available to senior students. The program works in cooperation with Advantage Living Center in Armada for students to complete their clinicals. Students are then able to take a board certification exam in which they will be tested on three of the twenty-one skills they have learned over the course of the year. Students drawn to the CNA program sometimes have goals of becoming registered nurses and use the CNA program as a stepping stone.
