Beginning this year, Warren Woods Tower (WWT) is providing students with the opportunity to begin their college education early, without the worry of having to pay for it, in Medi-cal Assisting through the Early College Baker (ECB) program. They are the people who take the patient's weight, height, vital signs, and other information regarding the patient's health. They may also give medication, draw blood, take xrays, and perform electrocardiograms (ECGs). They can be found working in doctor's offices or clinic settings. Having the ability to perform these skills also makes a MA desirable for employment in other areas such as hospitals, research centers, insurance companies, and schools.
