Fitzgerald auto graduates:

Navigating the automotive world after high school

Located on Ryan Road in Warren, Fitzgerald Senior High School stands proud. Among courses offered in the area of Career and Technical Education, one of the shining jewels that Fitzgerald has to offer are its auto programs. Not only because of the mere classroom aspect of what students are being taught, such as how to properly handle parts, how to handle certain situations, but all of these components and more are put to the test as students first enter the classroom. Minutes later, students are out in the garage in separate groups, working with the tools and technology that you would often see being used in mechanic shops ev-

Working on the Auto floor requires safety precautions that can be easily viewed if you were to step into the garage: an eyewash center, goggles and jumpsuits donned by the students, along with, at every car station, overhead tubes used to connect to exhaust pipes to keep the fumes from being inhaled. With these precautions and professional equipment in place, it is a guarantee that Fitzgerald's Auto Program is something to consider in case there are young adults will-

ing to enter into such a field.
Fitzgerald's Auto Program has had many graduates over the years. Some recent, even one who has graduated and still works at Fitzgerald to this very day, teaching the same classes that he once took himself, Mr. Jeff Bruni. Starting with Paul, his beginnings trail down to his freshman year, where his experience in a small engine repair class motivated him to continue down his path. He attended the auto





The impact imprinted onto him is big because of how hands-on the whole course was. As he says, there had to be a lot of building onto your skills and knowledge in order to complete tasks within the class. He uses the lessons he learned in school on a daily basis. "Every bit of information is taught for you to use in the field," Austin explains. Currently, Austin is employed at a local garage, but has been given a position at Audi after his post-secondary training. As he puts it, "Taking an automotive technology class as young as high school shows the employers that you're devoted, passionate, and educated." After high school he received an Associate degree in Applied Science of Automotive Technology from Macomb Community College, and is going on to complete training at Audi.

Austin plans on working for the Volkswagen Group of America, starting at Audi, and then working his way to their Porsche division. There, he hopes to gain enough knowledge and resources to assemble his own facility. Also after high school, Austin was certified by the state in all eight required categories to be known as a Michigan Master Mechanic, along with an ASE Section 609 certification for Air Conditioning and is currently completing requirements to qualify for additional ASE certifications. Final advice Austin would give, "The best way to learn is to want to learn; don't waste your time by learning something you don't want to learn or by ignoring something you need to learn." Austin continues, "Advisors and instructors need to inform students of the variety of automotive service career areas. Starting in this position can lead to many different paths. Mechanics are some of the most valued employees on the planet. They can be a home town farm worker or working on the most sophisticated cars. Automotive service is a path to a variety of success and opportunities."

In the auto shop, many students are given the opportunity of a lifetime: the chance of using your newfound knowledge to search for a career path. Jeff Bruni took Auto I, Auto II and Auto III to be informed of the automotive field, and earned an internship that allowed him to work after school for cash. This also was Bruni's most memorable moment in his CTE high school courses from Fitzgerald. Bruni also participated in the Career and Technical Education Programs in Automotive. He graduated from Fitzgerald High School in 1986, and has been employed at Fitzgerald High School for 29 years! Bruni intended to work for Fitzger-ald High School for a short time until he was called back to work. But it soon turned into a long-term position with more job security.

He now works in Fitzgerald's auto shop as a certified auto mechanic who teaches students how to get their hands dirty. Bruni deduced that working with his hands was most effective at the age of 14. Because of this, Bruni was aided by Fitzgerald's hands-on activities from the Auto classes. The impact of his CTE teacher, Jack Huhn, affected his decision to work at Fitzgerald because he realized he received benefits similar to the job where he was laid off.

The benefits he's gotten from Fitzgerald allowed him to achieve his goals: being an auto mechanic, and teaching students how to troubleshoot and problem solve. He finds it best to assist students who are interested in the automotive field. Bruni recommends that his students take the ASE certifications test. If the students pass, they may receive college credit toward their post high school technical degrees. Jeff Bruni shows everyone how his ambitions of becoming an auto mechanic were fulfilled: by hard work.
