There are many colleges and trade schools out there that students can attend to further their training in the automotive field and not be required to take any math or English classes, just the classes they wish to be in.


In as little as 9 months after graduation a student could be completed with the training and be qualified to take the

NH Medical Careers Receives Grant

The New Haven Medical Careers Classes received a CTE Secondary Equipment Grant from the Michigan Department of Education in early 2017.

The funds were used to purchase a new SPOT Vital Signs Unit with cart, an ECG Unit and a new Treatment/Exam Table.

The additional equipment will be used to teach in the hands-on approach in the CTE class. The SPOT vital signs unit will be highlighted during the Medical Assistant training portion

of the class.

The unit has the capability to measure patient Blood Pressure, Pulse, Temperature, and Blood Oxygen levels.

The ECG machine will give a whole new skill dimension to the class. The students will be able to practice the proper application techniques, and interpretation of basic resting ECG readings.

Being able to use the actual instruments that are used in the "real world" gives the students the confidence and skills needed to stay competitive in today's workforce.

Students have already started

putting the equipment to good use in practicing their Medical Assistant Skills and bedside manner.

The class plans on using the ECG in the next few weeks in addition to the other Medical Assistant Skills training.

"The new equipment makes me excited to come to class and enjoy learning. It helps me to better understand what it may be like to work in the real world with real equipment," according to Ashley Brohl Medical Careers II student.
