Armada High School is proud to offer a variety of Career and Technical Education programs to help connect our students for careers offering growth and opportunity. The skills students develop in our CTE programs are often supplemented through job shadowing and our Career Internship program, where students obtain work-based learning.

Our goal is to provide our CTE students advanced coursework and training that prepare them for industry certifications and employability. Students have the opportunity to take college-level career-related courses through Ferris State and Macomb Community College while at AHS. Many continue their education at technical colleges and report their learning experiences at Armada High School have them well-prepared for college success.

Currently we offer CTE programs in Business/Marketing, Renewable Energy, Building Trades, EMT, Certified Nursing Assistant, Medical Science, and Culinary Arts. All of our CTE programs are promoted and encouraged to be taken by all students. Our district requires a career sequence as a graduation requirement - two courses in the same career area must be taken over four years.

Armada Area Schools is proud to be a member of the Macomb Classroom to Career Talent Consortium which is part of the Marshall Plan for Talent Innovation Grant program. Collaborating with businesses and other districts, planning is underway to help prepare students for high demand and high wage career sectors. Creative and innovative approaches to education will be part of this emerging program.

## Armada Welcomes Back Culinary Arts

In Armada's new culinary class they are learning new things about the restaurant and food service industry. Students learn many different skills in this year's introductory course with the option next year to take more advanced courses when the program expands. Armada High School had a culinary program and a restaurant when the current facility opened back in 1976. Curriculum changes and a limit of student interest led to a closure of the program about ten years ago. The old commercial foods laboratory is currently under renovation for the re-established culinary arts program. The current lab being used is the school food service program kitchen.

Not only do they enjoy eating their own creations, they have had the opportunity to prepare meals for teachers during conferences and just recently created wonderful desserts for the board of education.

Many of the students taking this year's course are hoping to gain some life skills and learn how to eat healthier. Freshman Emily Rewers said, "This class was everything I was looking for because it has taught me important skills to use both in the kitchen with my fellow peers and I am also now able to help my mom with cooking, which is something I've wanted to do for a while."

Freshman Shelby Padyjasek likes how the course has stimulated her creativity in the kitchen. "I have learned a lot of new skills such as knife cutting skills and not only do I feel more safe holding a knife, but also feel more capable of making more variations of food than I did before."
