This is helping us because we are trying to write with more details in our own writing.

In math, we have started learning about fractions and decimals as well as geometry and measurement. We are really working hard and trying our best! Keep up the great work with the extra practice at home.

Please ask your students to tell you how many sides a quadrilateral or a hexagon has! We have been working our way up to identifying 10-sided polygons. Recently, students have been exploring area and perimeter. It would be beneficial (and fun) to find objects around the house and measure them for area and perimeter.

We also have some exciting things happening in science! Students are in the Life Science unit. They are discovering some very interesting plants. Your student can tell you about the poisonous black walnut tree. The can also tell you about tumbleweed. We discussed tumbleweed in our Life Science unit and again when it crossed curriculum into our social studies unit on the Southwest Region.
