
### **ROCKWELL MIDDLE SCHOOL**

Welcome to the start of the 2019-2020 school year here at Rockwell Middle School. The first progress period has flown by we are already close to the end of first quarter. This year, under the leadership of the Student Leadership Team, we remain focused on recognizing and reducing bullying. Students and staff have been working hard to bring awareness to this behavior and do our part to not participate in bullying and respond appropriately if it occurs. The student Leadership Team led an anti-bullying assembly to bring awareness, and has been sending strong positive messages on the importance of a bully free environment for all of our students.

As a reminder, with the weather getting colder, please review the dress code policy with your student. Outdoor wear (coats, hats, boots, gloves, etc) need to be put in lockers and remain there throughout the school day. Hoodies can be worn, but hoods must remain off. It is a good idea to review the dress code, and other sections of the handbook with your student often.

Costumes can be worn for in-building trick-or-treating (please see costume rules on the back on the Family Activity Night flyer), we will have Halloween crafts and cider and doughnuts. Parents/guardians will be contacted by the school when a student acquires five days of absences. A letter documenting the dates will follow.




# **Room 103**

# Room 106



Below you will find the characteristics we look for when considering whether a student is ready to begin partial integration back to their local school district.

## Characteristics for consideration for Transition:

- 1. You accept and follow staff direction (and that they are in charge of the classroom).
- 2. You accept others and are able to keep negative comments to yourself.

You have control over your own anger/reactions/actions and are willing to work wit staff on any issues that arise.

In order to be considered for integration the following must be observed for <u>at least</u> one quarter (10 weeks) of the school year.

90% or better attendance C average or better No Significant Behavior Incidents Satisfactory Citizenship



Generally, a student needs to be at Rockwell for at least a year before integration is considered, however we realize that all students have a different story and we are willing to meet to discuss the situations as they arise.

Once the parent is in agreement to look at integration we will contact the district in order to inform them of the intent. Often the staff from the local school will come out to do an observation of the student, with parent knowledge and permission, and then we will set up an IEP in order to plan the most appropriate schedule at both schools for your student.

# **Rockwell Middle School Dress Code**

Student dress and appearance that is neat, clean, and appropriate contributes to a positive school environment. Student's appearance/clothing, including hair color, should not disrupt the educational process, interfere with schoolwork, present a safety problem or cause extreme wear or damage to district property.

Thus, Students may not wear the following attire in school:

Sleeveless shirts, miniskirts, midriff tops, tank tops, halter tops, spandex clothing, cutoffs or revealing garments.

Clothing with alcohol, tobacco, drug or gang emblems, violence or sexual messages.

Outdoor wear/hats and coats in school. All must remain in student lockers during the school day.

Underwear and sleepwear (including slippers) as outer clothing.


Short shorts and skirts - length is to be as long as extended arms and fingertips.

Hoods on sweatshirts must remain off during the school day.

Indecent, torn, or dirty clothing that is distracting, extreme or conspicuous.

Students whose appearance/clothing is inappropriate will be required to change their appearance/clothing. Clothing may be available here or a parent/guardian may be called.

When questions over dress arise, the Principal or Designee will make the final determination on appropriateness.
